### **The Social Concerns Box**

The March Social Concerns Box is for three hunger relief programs in Montgomery County: Bethesda Help, the Manna Food Center, and Bethesda Cares. Hunger in our community comes in many forms and is probably more wide-spread than most of us realize. (Approximately 63,000 of our neighbors in Montgomery County are not always sure where their next meal is coming from.) The Social Concerns Box this month will be special in that we are collecting both monetary and food donations. The most helpful food donations are whole grain pasta, oatmeal, and rice; canned tuna, chicken, or salmon; beans (canned or dried), no- or low-sodium vegetables; cooking oil, and baby food. A box for food items will be on the landing near the door for the month of March.

<u>Bethesda Help</u> offers immediate short-term food and financial assistance for rent (to prevent eviction), utility bills (to prevent service interruption), and prescription medicines (as needed) to residents in southern Montgomery County. Manna Food Center (www.mannafood.org) provides nutritious food to approximately 6,000 families each month through its Smart Sacks bag program in 58 MCPS schools and 28,000 others across the county, especially in its new Silver Spring market. To learn more, please come to the presentation at the rise of Meeting on March 15.

<u>Bethesda Cares</u> serves the homeless in Bethesda. Its Housing First Program provides safe spaces for people to live before providing other social services and seems to effectively deal with many of the issues resulting in homelessness.

Please support the range of efforts to make our County hunger-free.

In January, Chesapeake Climate Action Network received \$280 via the Social Concerns Box.

## 15th: Hunger Relief in Montgomery County

On Sunday, March 15, at the rise of Meeting in the Meeting Room, the head of the Manna Food Center, will talk about new trends in hunger relief in Montgomery County and how her participation in the life of the Meeting shapes her professional journey. One aspect of the new trends is that social justice organizations are focusing on "zip code destiny," the phenomenon in which where you are born and raised shapes your ability to realize your full human potential. Manna Food Center has been implementing a place-based strategy focused on the dignity of choice, the role of "Food as Medicine," and addressing root causes of hunger and poverty through community engagement. The center currently reaches 34,000 of the approximately 63,000 of our neighbors in Montgomery County who don't always know where their next meal may come from and has made a number of major changes in an effort to reach the rest.

Founded in 1869, its mission is to provide "educational excellence based upon the Quaker values of equality, simplicity and peace." The school is a beacon of hope in a troubled land, and is immensely grateful for our support. Spring Fling, which engages scores of us, is built around four main activities, all of which welcome volunteers, donations, and customers.

The activities are:

- Silent Auction: This wide array of donated goods and services includes many kinds of items, such as household goods, jewelry, art work, photography, gift certificates to restaurants or theaters; services such as gardening consultations, handyman services, music lessons, home-made food or baked items; social events such as a dinner and/or discussion in your home, a wine and cheese gathering, or a film and discussion in your home. ## **Thinking About Race**

(From How To Be an Antiracist by Ibram X. Kendi, 2019)

Martin Luther King, Jr., disagreed with Brown vs. Board of Education, 1954. "I favor integration on buses and in all areas of public accommodation and travel.... I think integration in our public schools is different," King told two Black teachers in Montgomery, Alabama, in 1959. "White people view Black people as inferior.... People with such a low view of the black race cannot be given free rein and put in charge of the intellectual care and development of our boys and girls." (p. 177)

After Brown, the integrated White space came to define the ideal integrated space where inferior non-White bodies could be developed. The integrated Black space became a de facto segregated space where inferior Black bodies were left behind. Integration had turned into a "one-way street," a young Chicago lawyer observed in 1995. "The minority assimilate into the dominant culture, not the other way around,"

Barack Obama wrote. "Only white culture could be neutral and objective. Only white culture could be nonracial." Integration (into Whiteness) became racial progress. (p. 178)
